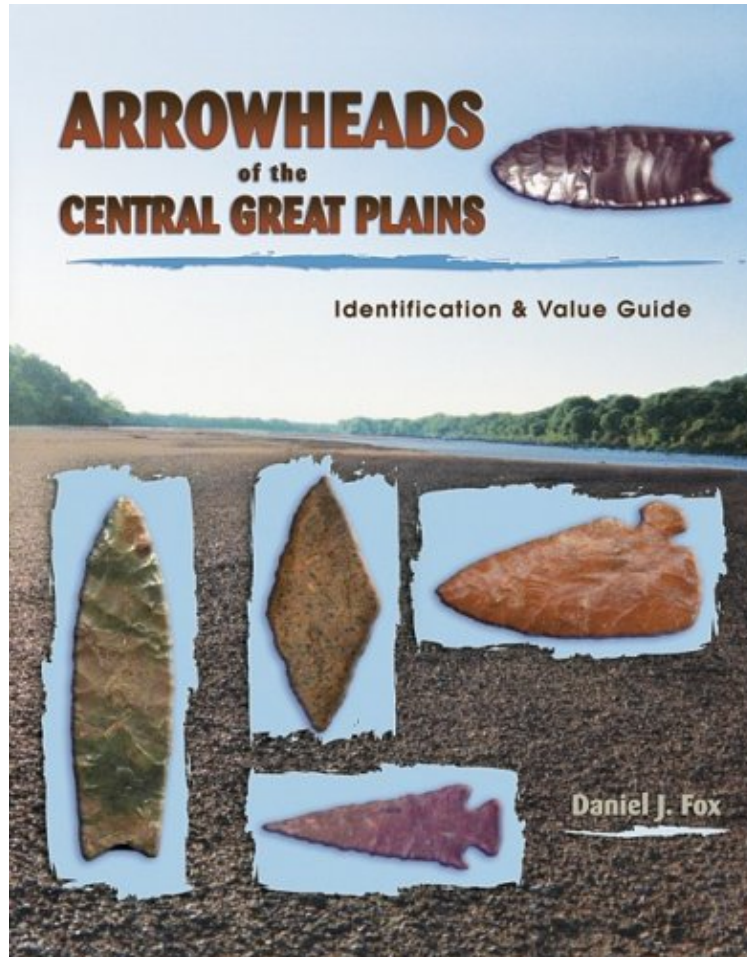

The book offers superb pictures and illustrations, the best this reader has seen. Fox describes the circumstances in which some of the items were found. He, and other artifact collectors like him, carefully note the provenance - the place and date of discovery, and then share the information they learn with other collectors, university archaeologists, and readers like you and me. This careful recording and sharing builds our knowledge of what life was like on the central plains from European settlement back to more than 10,000 years ago. If you like a lot of color photos that's about as good as it gets with this text. If you don't know much about archaeology it would be easy to think this is a good text. A quick review of the writings reveal a clear lack of understanding as it relates to basic English grammar. The dating of projectile points is seriously flawed as he skips between yrs AD year BP and KYA. There are several errors here as well as he dates a few artifacts AD 1500 to AD 2500 (or somewhere in that range). This is of course like saying this artifact was knapped some time between roughly 500 years ago and 500 years in the future. Other portions say something like 5,000-8,000 kya which would literally mean 5,000-8,000 thousand years ago (5,000,000 to 8,000,000 year ago). For someone that has a BS in Anthropology its beyond mind blowing that he doesn't understand basic dating nomenclature. The text is full of gratuitous name dropping and wreaks of narcissism.
